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From Memorized Speeches to Real Dialogue: My Reflections as a Moderator at the World Youth Meeting

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暗記の発表から本当の対話へ - WYM リーダーとしての振り返り

1. A Hot Summer and My Role as Leader

This summer felt much hotter than usual, and the heat made every task more exhausting. As the leader of the student executive committee, I constantly moved around the venue to check the schedule, support the presenters, and solve unexpected problems. I often found myself running from one corner of the hall to another, coordinating with both staff and participants. Although it was physically demanding and sometimes stressful, it gave me a strong sense of responsibility and pride. Being trusted with this role was both a challenge and a valuable learning experience.

1. 暑い夏とリーダーとしての役割

今年の夏は例年よりもずっと暑く、その暑さがあらゆる仕事をより大変なものにしました。私は学生実行委員会のリーダーとして、常に会場を動き回り、スケジュールを確認したり、発表者を支援したり、思いがけない問題を解決したりしました。会場の端から端へ走り、スタッフや参加者と調整を行うことも多くありました。体力的にきつく、時にはストレスも感じましたが、その経験は大きな責任感と誇りを私に与えてくれました。この役割を任されたことは挑戦であると同時に、とても価値ある学びの機会でもありました。

2. A New Kind of Presentation

In previous years, many presentations seemed to focus on memorizing and delivering difficult words. Students sometimes spoke in a way that felt like reciting a textbook, showing knowledge but not truly expressing themselves. This year, however, I noticed a clear change. Presenters tried to address real issues in the world and express their personal opinions in their own words. They connected their ideas with their feelings, and this made their presentations more authentic and meaningful. I was truly glad to see this shift, because I have often heard in class that 'a presentation is essentially a conversation,' and this year I finally understood what that means.

2. 新しいプレゼンテーションのかたち

これまでの年は、多くの発表が「難しい単語を覚えて話す」ことに重点を置いているように見えました。学生たちはまるで教科書を暗唱するように話し、知識は示せても自分自身を表現できていないように感じられることもありました。しかし今年は明らかな変化がありました。発表者たちは世界の現実的な問題に向き合い、自分の意見を自分の言葉で語ろうとしていました。考えと気持ちを結びつけて表現することで、発表はより本物らしく、意味のあるものになっていました。授業で「プレゼンは会話である」と何度も聞いてきましたが、今年初めてその意味を心から理解することができました。

3. Conversation and Responsibility

A conversation is not just the exchange of words. It requires responsibility. When you speak, you are responsible for what you say, and you use your whole personality to communicate your ideas. In that sense, speaking in front of others becomes a form of inquiry, or what we might call 'exploration.' This exploration is not only about gathering facts but also about reflecting deeply on one's own views and sharing them with others. I realized that presentations are powerful because they are not about repeating information but about engaging in a dialogue that carries personal weight and authenticity.

3. 会話と責任

会話とは単に言葉を交わすことではありません。そこには責任が伴います。人前で話すとき、 発言の内容に責任を持ち、自分の人格全体を通して考えを伝える必要があります。その意味 で、人前で話すことは一種の「探求」であり、深く自分の意見を見つめ直し、それを他者と共 有する営みです。プレゼンテーションの力は、情報を繰り返すことではなく、重みのある対話 に参加し、誠実に自分の考えを伝えるところにあるのだと気づきました。

4. From Reading to Real Speaking

When students only try to recite what they have memorized, the delivery often turns into reading aloud. Such presentations sound flat and lack emotion. The speaker's feelings and individuality are hidden, and the audience cannot connect with the message. In contrast, when a presentation becomes a real act of speaking, the voice carries rhythm, emotion, and personality. This year, I felt that many students consciously tried to avoid the 'reading style' and instead aimed for more natural and interactive speaking. This gave their presentations life and made them much more effective and inspiring.

4. 朗読から本当のスピーチへ

学生が暗記したことをただ繰り返そうとすると、発表は「朗読」になりがちです。そのようなプレゼンは平板で、感情もこもらず、聞き手が共感できません。一方、本当のスピーチは声にリズムや感情、そして個性が表れます。今年は、多くの学生が意識的に「朗読型」を避け、より自然で双方向的なスピーチを目指していたように感じました。その努力が発表に命を吹き込み、より効果的で心を動かすものになっていました。

5. My Experience as a Moderator

One of my main responsibilities this year was serving as the moderator of a panel discussion. At first, I felt nervous, because I had to balance different roles—encouraging the Japanese high school students to

participate, translating when necessary, and keeping the discussion on track. Through this experience, I realized that although Japanese students are not very confident in speaking English, they do have strong listening skills. They are curious, attentive, and eager to ask questions when they have the chance. As a moderator, I sometimes gave short explanations in Japanese to help them understand the context. Then, I asked the international



representatives questions in English on their behalf. For example, I asked a Chinese student whether there were strict rules controlling young people in China. The student replied that although some rules exist, young people are generally free to think and speak for themselves. I also asked a Malaysian student about the government's policy of supporting Palestine. I wanted to know whether it was difficult for Malaysia, as a multi-ethnic society, to maintain such a clear position. The student explained that Malaysians practice harmony and coexistence in their daily lives, and that this natural sense of harmony extends to supporting peace and democracy, including the issue of Palestine. These answers left a strong impression on me because they showed how different cultures and societies find their own ways of balancing freedom, harmony, and responsibility.

5. 司会者としての経験

今年、私の大きな役割のひとつはパネルディスカッションの司会でした。最初はとても緊張しました。なぜなら、日本の高校生の参加を促し、必要に応じて通訳し、議論を進行させるという複数の役割を同時に担わなければならなかったからです。しかしこの経験を通じて、日本の高校生は英語を話す自信はあまりないけれど、聞く力は強いのだと気づきました。彼らは好奇心が強く、集中して聞き、質問をしたいという気持ちを持っています。私は時々、日本語で短く説明を加え、そのうえで代表者に英語で質問をしました。たとえば、中国の学生には「若者を規制する厳しいルールはありますか」と尋ねました。その答えは「多少のルールはあるが、基本的に自由に考え、自由に発言できる」というものでした。また、マレーシアの学生には政府のパレスチナ支援について尋ねました。多民族国家であるマレーシアにとって、そのような明確な立場を保つのは難しくないのかと聞いたのです。すると学生は「マレーシアでは日常的に調和と共生を実践しており、その自然な延長として平和や民主主義、そしてパレスチナ支援がある」と答えてくれました。これらの答えは強い印象を残し、異なる文化や社会がそれぞれのやり方で自由・調和・責任をバランスさせていることを示していました。

6. The Difference in English Learning

During the discussion, I was struck by the clear difference in English ability between countries. Students from Malaysia and the Philippines were very fluent in English. This is because they learn many school subjects—such as science, history, and social studies—in English from a young age. It is said that by the time they finish high school, they have studied about 5,000 hours in English. In contrast, Japanese students only study English for around 800 hours during junior and senior high school. This huge gap naturally leads to different levels of confidence and fluency in speaking. Understanding this difference helped me realize that Japanese students should not compare themselves directly, but instead focus on using the opportunities they have to practice English meaningfully.

6. 英語学習の違い

議論を通して、国ごとの英語力の違いを強く感じました。マレーシアやフィリピンの学生は非常に流暢に英語を話します。その理由は、幼いころから理科や歴史、社会などの多くの教科を英語で学んでいるからです。高校を卒業するまでに、およそ 5,000 時間を英語で学ぶと言われています。一方、日本の学生が中学・高校で英語を学ぶ時間はわずか 800 時間ほどです。この大きな差が、自信や流暢さの違いにつながっています。この違いを理解することで、日本の学生は他国と単純に比べるのではなく、限られた機会をいかに有効に使うかに目を向けるべきだと学びました。

7. The Value of the Symposium

For me, the World Youth Meeting is not simply a stage for presentations. It is more than memorized speeches and prepared slides. It is a symposium—a place for dialogue, exchange, and understanding. Here, we can learn about real situations in the world, directly from the people who live in them. Meeting face-to-face with students from other countries transforms global issues into personal experiences. Even if the Japanese high school students



only understood half of what was said, that partial understanding was still powerful. It motivated them to keep studying and to try harder to use English in real communication. The symposium created an atmosphere where students could feel the value of English as a living tool for connecting with the world, not just as a subject in school.

7. シンポジウムの価値

私にとってワールドユースミーティングは、単なる発表の場ではありません。それは暗記したスピーチや準備されたスライド以上のものです。それは「シンポジウム」であり、対話と交流、そして理解の場です。ここでは、世界の現実を実際にその国に住む人から直接学ぶことができます。外国の学生と直接顔を合わせることで、世界の課題が個人的な経験として迫ってきます。日本の高校生が理解できたのは半分程度だったかもしれません。しかし、その「半分」でさえ大きな力を持っていました。それは学び続ける意欲を与え、英語を実際のコミュニケーションで使おうとする動機になりました。シンポジウムは、英語を「学校の科目」ではなく「世界とつながる生きた道具」として実感できる場を作っていたのです。

8. Final Reflections

Looking back, I feel deeply honored to have been part of the World Youth Meeting as a moderator and organizer. The experience taught me about leadership, responsibility, and the importance of dialogue. It also reminded me that learning is not just about knowledge but about connection. I believe that next year, more students should join not only as presenters but also as active participants in the dialogue. Making comments, asking questions, and sharing thoughts are just as important as giving speeches. The real strength of this event lies in the opportunity to meet others, exchange ideas, and grow together. For me, being able to help create such a space was a meaningful and unforgettable experience. I am proud to have taken part in it, and I hope that more young people will discover the same joy of dialogue in the years to come.

8. 最後の振り返り

振り返ると、司会者や運営者としてワールドユースミーティングに参加できたことは、大きな誇りです。この経験から、リーダーシップ、責任、そして対話の重要性を学びました。また、学びとは知識を得ることだけでなく、人とつながることなのだと強く感じました。来年は、もっと多くの学生が発表者としてだけでなく、対話に積極的に参加してくれることを願っています。コメントをすること、質問をすること、考えを共有することは、スピーチと同じくらい大切です。このイベントの真の力は、出会い、意見を交換し、ともに成長できる機会にあります。私にとって、このような場づくりに関わることができたのは忘れられない貴重な経験でした。この場に参加できたことを誇りに思い、これからも多くの若者が「対話の喜び」を見つけてくれることを願っています。

1. Cambodia and the Perception of Poverty

4. The Meaning of Learning and Moving Forward Together


Through connections across borders, we are able to learn from one another and move forward together. This mutual exchange allows both Cambodian and Japanese students to discover new perspectives and strengths.

STUDENT PARTICIPATION REPORT

Ritsumeikan University, Telcome university, Gadjamadha University

1. Thoughts after onsite exchange and presentation

I got two opportunities to present: WYM presentation and presentation at panel discussion section. First, I was amazed at myself because I was really relaxed on the stage. It was thanks to my team members because I trusted they would do well. I also had confidence to speak in public through experience of studying abroad. When other teams presented, I was also amazed at their creative ideas, especially high school team. I enjoyed listening to their presentation and also looking for good models of speaking. At the second day, I presented about education in Indonesia. Because the Indonesian members cannot join timely, I recorded the video and showed it. At the class, I took role in MC, speakers, and facilitator, it was not easy to manage time and promote students' discussion. The second day was a chance to share Indonesian culture too, so, I put food part in the slide and brought some snacks from Indonesia because eating is most familiar to us. I think this strategy succeeded.

2. Learning outcomes and challenges for future

I found challenges when I answered the question and summarized the opinion. It is needed to get experience to discuss with foreign people more to get skills of summarizing. Time management was also difficult for me if unexpected things had happened. But as Kanda-sensei said before, everything has social lesson. I have learned a lot of things from World Youth Meeting. For example, to control my feelings in public, manage schedule, and understand that not everyone does not behave nicely toward us. Adjusting flexibly does not mean I am easily swayed by others, but it is the way to control more easily people who are opposed to me. Living cleverly and smartly is not easy, but important for the future. The roles of leader gave me many lessons and confidence. Confidence for managing schedule well, leading people nicely, and executing events flexibly. These confidence and life lessons, I will remember and make use of to future jobs after graduation.

1. Onsite exchange

After the presentation, I felt truly happy and grateful because many of the attendees genuinely empathized with the story I shared. Several were surprised to learn that the Garifuna people dance even in the presence of death. For me, this was a powerful and defining moment—not only for myself, but I believe also for them. They discovered a completely different way of saying farewell to those who are no longer with us, and they witnessed how art and culture can be used as a voice to protest against injustice while, at the same time, serving as a way to honor and remember.

The discussion that followed each presentation was incredibly rich and inspiring. I enjoyed listening to the reflections of others and seeing how open-minded the students were. They showed a genuine willingness to understand perspectives and traditions different from their own, which made the

exchange even more meaningful.

This experience reinforced my belief that cultural expression is a powerful tool for creating empathy and bridging differences. It was deeply rewarding to see my presentation spark curiosity, reflection, and meaningful dialogue among the audience, and I left the event feeling inspired and more connected to the purpose of sharing my heritage.

2. Learning outcomes

From this experience, I learned the value of adaptability and creative thinking when facing challenges. Preparing without a team pushed me to work more independently and to collaborate closely with Kanda-sensei, which strengthened both my confidence and my ability to make decisions. I also realized that a presentation can be more impactful when it offers a balanced perspective—acknowledging the reality of violence while also highlighting the resilience, beauty, and strength found in cultural traditions. Sharing the story of the four Garifuna leaders taught me the power of personal narratives to connect with people on an emotional level, while the audience's reactions reminded me that art can transcend language and cultural barriers, becoming both a voice of protest and a vessel of remembrance. Seeing how open and willing the students were to understand different perspectives reinforced my belief that cultural expression is a bridge that can bring people closer together. This event not only deepened my appreciation for my own heritage but also strengthened my commitment to use art and culture as tools for empathy, awareness, and change.

1. Challenges during the online meetings

2. Learning outcomes

This was the most memorable summer of my life. WYM not only gave me precious experiences, but also made me more mature and confident, as it was the biggest stage I have ever spoken on. Through

this journey, I learned that teamwork is truly essential — each person has their own strengths and weaknesses, but by understanding and supporting one another, we can achieve great results.

One of the most valuable lessons I gained from this program is that listening is a powerful communication tool. By keeping an open mind and embracing new ideas, I was able to experience things that I will never forget.

In the future, if I have the chance, I would love to join WYM again — to make more friends, broaden my horizons, and continue to improve myself.

1. Challenges during online exchange

I had to many worries during this meeting. The first was that I had to be the MC in English, and the second was whether I could remember and present my part well. For the first worry, I felt very nervous because I did not understand exactly what I had to do. I was also the only first-year student, which made me feel even more anxious. I was worried about communicating in English. However, MC members listened carefully to my poor English, and I taught them some Japanese, so we had meaningful communication. Thanks to talking with them the day before, I could MC smoothly and create a good atmosphere. My second worry was because, in the practice the day before, I could not speak smoothly and often stopped. On the actual day, there was an accident when the computer did not work well, but I stayed calm and could read my part without stopping until the end. In the end, I was happy because everything went better than I expected, and I learned that presentation and teamwork are very important.

2. Learning outcomes

Before this project, I felt a strong resistance to using English because, as I have mentioned before, I was not confident in my English skills. I often worried that I would make mistakes or that others would not understand me. However, through this project, I learned the joy of communicating in English. I realized that even if my English is not perfect, I can still share my ideas and connect with other people. This gave me more confidence and motivation to keep learning. I do not have any plans to study abroad, but I want to speak more actively and use English consciously in future English classes and other activities. Also, even thought the topic was very difficult, I was deeply impressed by the wonderful presentations given by the high school students. Their ideas and expressions were inspiring. I think I will have many opportunities to give presentations at the university, so I want to remember what I learned from them and try to use those techniques in my own work. This experience taught me that making an effort to communicate and learning from others are both very important for my growth.

1. Thoughts after onsite exchange and presentation

the process, and to avoid making any last-minute changes. I would also like to pursue more international studies and learning programs to further my knowledge.

- 1. オンサイト交流と発表後の感想(Thoughts after onsite exchange and presentation) 実際にオンサイトで顔を合わせると、オンラインで感じていた言語の壁は思った以上に小さくなり、予想以上にスムーズにコミュニケーションが取れた。発表に関しては、数日前からオンラインでリハーサルを重ね、さらに前日には実際のステージで繰り返し練習していたこともあり、本番は落ち着いて進めることができた。発表後には達成感を強く感じるとともに、台湾のメンバーとのお土産交換を通して授業外での文化交流もできたことが印象に残っている。お互いの国についてより深く知るきっかけになり、単なる学術的な交流にとどまらない広がりを持つ経験になった。

1. 参加前と参加後で変わったこと


④ 学びと今後への課題/Achievements and challenges

This experience was more than just an exchange of language and knowledge—it was a heartfelt connection that left a lasting impact on me.











この経験を通じて、海外の生徒と「平和を考える」ことの難しさに気づいた。知識や情報だけでなく、自ら考えて議論し、責任を持って行動できる力をつけなければ、どれほど 国際的な会議を重ねても実質的な変化は生まれないだろう問題の本質に向き合い、真の解決に近づくための議論ができる人間でありたいと思う。



平和の扱われ方

World Youth Meeting という世界中の若者が SDG16 の平和と公正をテーマに国境を越えて語り合う会に参加した。私は台湾人と日本人の混合チームでプレゼンターを務め、準備段階からチームで資料作りや構成の議論を行った。参加前は賞のことなど全く考えておらず、平和について深く話し合えることに期待していた。しかし本番後、Grand Platinum賞を受賞したときには嬉しさと達成感を感じた。

しかし、一方でちょっとした違和感が残った。 会の中では、負の感情を抱く場面がいくつもあった。あるチームは「中国人に間違えられて嫌だった」と大々的に発言した。それは私には中国人差別のように聞こえた。もちろん本人は自分のアイデンティティが否定された悲しみを表したかったのかもしれないが、「ほかの人種ならよかった」と受け取れかねない言葉選びは避けるべきだと思った。また、打ち上げ会で「台湾が 1 番!」と叫ぶ人が現れ、それに続いて「日本が 1 番!」と返す人がいた。愛国心自体は悪くないが、平和を語る場で国同士を競うような空気感は明らかにミスマッチのように感じられた。さらに、スリランカの人たちが日本語を話す動画を見て、同じ系列校の参加者が笑い、揶揄する場面もあった。それは、ちょうど母国語ではない英語を使い、プレゼンを発表した直後の出来事で、はっきり言って衝撃と落胆が大きかった。

こうした経験から、平和とはかけ離れた行動は言葉や態度の端々にこそ表れると痛感した。そしてもう一つ強く感じたのは、「知らずに差別やいじめをしている人」への対応は比較的可能だが、「知っていながらする人」への対処は極めて難しいということだ。実際、チームの中でいじめについて議論した際も、「いじめを認識していながら行う人」に対しては有効な手段が見つからず、最終的には「知らずにいじめをしている人に対して何らかの行動をし、訴えかける」という方針に落ち着いた。しかし、現実には後者の方が圧倒的に母数として多く、対処の必要性が高いはずだ。だからこそ、この問題をどう扱っていくかが今後の自分の課題として浮かび上がった。

Preparation for the Presentation:

We had many discussions on the topic of child abuse. However, due to my limited English skills and the difficulty of listening and understanding in online meetings, I was unable to speak up at all. In conclusion, this eight-day exchange not only gave me a deeper understanding of Japan, enriched my knowledge, boosted my confidence and independence, but also taught me the importance of planning, communication, and cooperation. These lessons will be valuable for my future studies and life.

WYM Asian Student Exchange Program Experience: Before and After

Before joining the World Youth Meeting, I thought I would be terrified. I imagined myself being too nervous, maybe even speechless, with no words to say.

After the competition:

But after coming here, I realized that everyone is full of energy and confidence. No matter their topic or English level, they are still brave and excited to show themselves. This experience gave me the courage to speak English more confidently with people from other countries. Since this is my first international competition, it has become a great opportunity for me not only to meet people overseas but also to understand myself better.

Working with Seishin Gakuen Secondary School

I think the chance to cooperate with Japanese students is really special. Before this experience, I used to think of Japanese people in a stereotype — that they might be shy and not very confident. But after actually working with them, I realized they are not only a little shy, but also very energetic and passionate.

This opportunity also gave me the chance to understand Japan better, because I could talk with local students and learn what they are truly thinking about. And there is one thing I found pretty special. I noticed that Japanese students think in a different way compared to Taiwanese students. As a Taiwanese student, I am more used to looking at the result first and then working backwards. But Japanese students prefer to start from the beginning and move step by step toward the result. For me, this felt like a kind of culture shock, and I thought it was really cool.

The Japanese students also taught me how to prepare a project more carefully and how to look at an issue from different angles. And I also noticed something pretty special. At the beginning, our group was going to talk about social security issues, and we decided to focus on the topic of "terrorism." But then I realized that the definition of terrorism in Japan and Taiwan is totally different.

In Taiwan, when we think about terrorism, we usually imagine random attacks on people that cause many to get hurt. But for Japanese students, their definition of terrorism is much broader — it could include anything that harms society. At first, this difference made it difficult for us to communicate with each other.

I think this was a very cool experience, because it showed me that even though our countries are geographically close, we can still have very different understandings of the same word. It made me realize that sometimes misunderstandings can happen across cultures, and it also gave me the chance to reflect more deeply on this.

And there is another thing I noticed that was really special. The Japanese students were very kind and always cared about everyone's emotions. During our discussions, sometimes some of us felt frustrated or even a little angry when others couldn't understand our English, and small arguments happened. But I noticed that the Japanese students would try to calm things down. For example, they would come to me and ask, "What happened? Are you okay?"

I think this really touched me, because as a Taiwanese student, I usually focus more on the final result rather than on other people's emotions or feelings. But the Japanese students showed me how important it is to care about others, and I think that's really cool.

My thought after experiencing collaboration as a team

My story after experiencing team collaboration is a bit complex, because I have many thoughts—some about myself, and some about my teammates.

Starting with myself, I realized that I still have areas where I can improve, such as my temper. Sometimes I get frustrated when things don't go the way I expect. But then I noticed that everyone was working hard on the project. It's not only me who wanted the project to be perfect—everyone shared the same goal. So I shouldn't get upset at others, because we were all working for the same purpose. This is something I need to improve about myself.

As for team collaboration, I think there is still a lot for me to learn. As the team leader, I should have given clearer directions to my teammates. I realized that if the leader doesn't set a clear direction, people don't know what to do, and the team can easily get misled. For example, in the beginning, our team split into two groups to discuss ideas, but that made it difficult to combine everything into one final project. Looking back, I think I could have done better by having a full-group discussion from the start, making sure that everyone agreed on the same direction and next steps.

This is the part that gave me the most reflection, and I think it's an important lesson for me to grow as both a person and a leader.

My accomplishments and regrets

I think the thing I regret most about this World Youth Meeting is that I didn't have much time to talk with my Japanese partners. I feel a bit sad about this, because we probably won't meet each other again in the future. I hope that in the future, there will be more opportunities to communicate and get to know others better.

At the competition venue, I also wish I had been more talkative. I should have talked to more people, because it really gives a chance to learn and connect. But due to my personality as a Chinese student, I feel I missed a lot of opportunities. If I have the chance to attend WYM a second time, I will definitely be more talkative, energetic, and try to meet more people.

Everyone attending WYM was amazing, no matter their nationality or background. They all care deeply about making the world a better place for the next generation. Even the teachers and judges were impressive. If I have more opportunities in the future, I would love to talk to everyone there.


3. My thought after experiencing collaboration as a team

This was an important aspect of our work distribution, as the judges wanted to see how we overcame the language barrier.

For me, this is the first time I have participated in such a large cross-border program, which honestly made me feel a bit anxious. Although some negative aspects of the competition occurred, I still learned a great deal from the experience. I have become more aware of my abilities and the role I play in group projects. This has been a truly unforgettable experience, and I look forward to having more opportunities to join similar programs in the future.
